

2026 Cub Scout/Webelos Adventure Camp Information Guide



Camp John J. Barnhardt July 11-14, 2026

Cost: \$175 Scout and \$100 Leader



Dear Scouter/Parent

Camp John J. Barnhardt has a long history of offering an exciting Webelos resident camp for rising 4th and 5th graders. **This summer, we're continuing our expanded program to include rising 2nd and 3rd graders! Camp Barnhardt will have an overnight summer camp for these Cub Scouts working on their Wolf and Bear badges!**

All activities are run by the same staff that run camp for the four weeks of Scout camp but modified to fit Cub Scout programming and the needs of younger campers. Though Packs may camp together, we'll run separate activities for the Wolf, Bear, Webelos, and Arrow of Light scouts. Programs will be matched to their interests and advancement goals according to the new Cub Scout program introduced in June 2024. Our camp staff all complete an additional 8 hours of training specific to leading Cub/Webelos Scout events (on top of the 28 hours of training for Boy Scout camp).

Participants will get to visit the climbing tower, play in the pool, take out canoes, use the BB gun range, do crafts, and shoot archery. Most activities will allow scouts to earn adventure belt loops appropriate to their rank. In addition, there will be campfires, sports competitions, games based on the annual theme, and loads of fun. During the camp there will be opportunities for the youth to show their Scout spirit and work together as Patrols. Activities at our Webelos camp are all done with their den/unit or group of similarly ranked Cubs (there is no need to select individual badges/activities like Scouts BSA do, but we ask that you indicate Wolf/Bear/Webelos/AoL when registering so we can schedule your fun accordingly).

Rising 2nd and 3rd graders must attend with a parent since this is a three-night camping event. Rising 4th and 5th graders may attend with Pack leadership (Leaders must be trained, YPT procedures followed, and the pack must maintain a 1:5 Leader:Cub Scout ratio).

Registration fees includes a patch, 1 t-shirt, and all meals. Breakfast and dinner are served in the air-conditioned dining hall while lunch is delivered to the campsites to allow campers time to rest in the middle of the day. Canvas wall tents with two cots are provided. Per Scouting policy, if the Pack does not have 2 adults attending (and 1 additional adult for every 5 scouts over 10), we will merge your unit with another small group for the duration of the camp.

We hope your Pack will join us for Cub and Webelos camp this summer!

Registration Steps

1. Obtain information for each of the participants using the above form or similar. Table above is for pack information to enter on council website.
2. Go to the CNCC website (www.centralnccouncilbsa.com)
3. Click on the banner on our homepage to begin registration.
4. At the bottom of the registration page, click on register.
5. Log in or create a profile to register.
6. Choose a group (i.e. Pack 443) or create a new group for this event.
7. You can reserve a block of spaces or begin adding names to your group.
8. Add names to your group. Note: you can close the group and edit it later.
9. Once you have completed adding names, close the group.
10. Final payment and medical forms for each participant, both youth and adult, must be in the council office by the closing date or additional charges will be due.

Caution: The Pack will be charged for all spaces reserved in the block, even if they don't have names in them.

Note: This event will fill up fast. Registration should be made as soon as possible because the spaces are allocated on a first come, first serve basis. Camp Barnhardt will only hold 200 people for this event. Frequently Asked Questions

1. Can a single Scout attend camp?

Yes, but only if they attend with a parent or guardian that has Safeguarding Youth training. There are no provisional dens at camp. Guideline to Safe Scouting rules must be followed.

2. Can a Pack with only one adult attend camp?

Yes. Two Packs can camp together to meet Two-Deep Leadership requirements. Check with the Camp Director.

3. Can Adults/Scouts leave Camp Barnhardt during camp?

Yes, if they check-out and check-in according to camp procedures. However, it is not recommended that Scouts leave because the program is very full and they may miss key events.

4. Will there be a Trading Post?

Yes, our Trading Post will be open periodically during Cub/Webelos Camp.

5. Will there be insects or spiders?

Depending on the weather, there could be some insects during your visit. There are sometimes spiders in your tents. Please do not use any sprays or chemicals inside of the tents. Some scouts bring personal tents or bug nets to help reduce contact.

6. Can a Scout stay in the same tent as their parent?

Yes. Scouts are encouraged to bunk/tent with other scouts. Some Scouts may feel more comfortable camping with their parent. Guide to Safe Scouting only allows a scout tenting with their own parent or guardian.

7. Does every scout have to take a swim test?

All scouts are encouraged to take the swim test. However, if they cannot swim, they will be given a non-swimmer buddy tag and their aquatic activities will be restricted.

8. Are campsites assigned?

Yes, your Pack will be placed in a campsite with other Packs. An effort will be made to balance the numbers in a campsite to avoid overcrowding and to ensure each rotating group has similar numbers.

9. Are campfires allowed in the campsites? Should we bring firewood?

Campsite fires are allowed as long as there is not a BURNING BAN in effect. There should be plenty of wood around the campsites so outside wood shouldn't be needed. Please bring fire buckets with you.

10. What program supplies should we bring?

All program supplies will be supplied. Some Packs may choose to bring snacks or other food items. Remember: food attracts animals to campsites.

12. Should we bring our Field Uniform?

Yes, it is suggested that you bring your Field Uniform(Class A) for flag ceremonies. During the day, your Scout may wear their pack t-shirt or any scouting shirt for the activities around camp.

Swim Checks

Swim checks for each camper/leader will be conducted at the pool on day of check-in after the packs/dens have unpacked. Standard BSA requirements are:

Swimmer

- Jump feet first into water over head, level off and begin swimming.
- Swim 75 yards in a strong manner using one or more of the following strokes: side, breast, trudgen or crawl. Swim 25 yards using easy, resting backstroke.
- The 100 yards must complete without stops and must include one sharp turn.
- Rest by floating...long enough to demonstrate ability to rest when exhausted.

Beginner

- Jump feet first, level off and begin swimming.
- Swim 25 feet on surface.
- Stop, turn, and resume swimming back to starting place.

Non-swimmer

- Did not complete either of the swim checks.

Buddy tags will be provided for each camper and leader. The tags will remain with each group leader except when used as a group participation in an aquatic activity. The aquatics staff will work with each scout to help them become a swimmer if possible.

Swim checks can be completed prior to your arrival at camp. The checks can be scheduled at local pool with the approval of the Aquatics Director.

Camp Access

Camp Barnhardt is accessible to persons with special needs and abilities. Please contact the Camp Director in advance for assistance.

Visitors/Siblings Policy

Visitors are always welcome at Camp Barnhardt. They must report in and out at the Camp Office located in Montgomery Lodge to obtain proper ID before entering activity areas or campsites. Identification should be worn and visible by all persons while on camp property.

There is a "No-Sibling" policy. Cub/Webelos Camp is designed for 2nd, 3rd, 4th and 5th graders and we have no programs for siblings. Note: Some of the activity areas and dining hall are significant distances apart and will require much walking in some cases. If a leader/parent must bring an older sibling to camp an exception to this policy may be made. Please contact the Camp Director or Program Director.

Gear Suggestions

Pack gear - pack flag, water cooler, ice, fire building supplies, lanterns, ropes and first aid kit.

Individual's gear- Sleeping bag, pillow, scout uniform, activity shirts, pants, underwear, socks, swimsuit, towel, rain poncho, hat, comfortable shoes, toothbrush/toothpaste, wash cloth, soap, deodorant, water bottle, personal first aid kit, sunscreen, insect repellent, flashing light with extra batteries and folding camp chair.

NO CROCKS, FLIP FLOPS, KEENS OR OPEN TOE SHOES IN CAMP.

Camp Rules/Etiquette

1. The Scout Oath, Law and Outdoor Code will be always followed. Violation of rules or conduct unbecoming of a Scout may lead to expulsion from camp.
2. Each den must provide adequate supervision with at least one adult leader for each 5 scouts as a minimum. The BSA Two-Deep Leadership policy will be strictly always enforced. Scouts must be supervised even during "pick-up" games of tag, soccer, or similar activities.
3. Alcoholic beverages are not allowed at any BSA event. Possession of them will result in removal from camp.
4. Illegal drugs found at the encampment or suspicion of illegal drugs will not only result in dismissal from camp, but camp staff will notify local law enforcement.
5. In accordance with BSA policy, liquid fuels may be used for cooking and lighting only if the fuels are used under adult supervision.
6. If a burning ban **IS NOT** in effect, campfires are permitted in campsites. Dug fire pits are allowed if the pack uses Leave No Trace. Fires must be always attended. Fires must be cold before checking out from camp.
7. Campsites should follow low-impact camping guidelines.
8. Sheath knives or fixed blade knives are not permitted at camp.
9. Defacing any camp property, including live trees, may result in immediate dismissal from camp with repair cost settled before dismissal.
10. Radios, TVs, electronic games, or other electric devices are not permitted.
11. Fireworks are strictly prohibited.
12. No bicycles will be permitted.
13. Quiet time should be observed by all in campsites.

Registration

Registration is on a first come, first serve basis, and will remain open until camp is filled to the capacity of 200 campers or June 29. Any registrations after the deadline must be approved by the Camp Director. **After registration, the following items must be submitted to the CNCC office by July 3rd. Camp Roster Form, Full Payment and BSA Health Form (A and B) for all Scouts and Leaders.**

Camp Cost

Resident Camp cost is \$175 per Scout and \$100 per Leader/Adult. A limited number of camperships are available. Campership applications are available from the council service center. Email Jp.grillo@Scouting.org for campership form.

Check-In

Scouts, Leaders, and adults will be checked in at Lone Scout Lodge on July 11th from 2pm to 4pm. Only one representative of the Den/Pack should be responsible for check-in of the group. We encourage Den/Packs to travel together and arrive at the same time. At check-in each scout & leader will be given one camp uniform shirts and their medical form reviewed. If the pack has a trailer, it may be moved to the assigned campsite for the duration of camp. A staffer will show the campers to the assigned campsite and help them get settled. For safety, cars must remain in the parking lot until check-out.

Sleeping Arrangements

Each assigned campsite will have an adequate number of two person tents for your pack and other packs that share your assigned site. Scouts are encouraged to tent with other Scouts. The picnic shelter will be shared by all in each campsite. Safeguarding Youth Guidelines must be always followed. All tents have netting but if you choose, you may bring additional mosquito nets. Some leaders may choose to bring their own tents.

Meals

All meals will be provided and served in our air-conditioned Cannon Dining Hall starting with Saturday night dinner. Water will be available at all campsites and program areas. Dens/Packs are encouraged to keep water coolers in their camping area to encourage fluid consumption and avoid dehydration. Ice will be available for purchase at the trading post.

PLEASE NOTE ANY SPECIAL DIETS AND FOOD ALLERGIES in the notes area so the dining hall staff can be adequately prepared to meet everyone's needs.

Trading Post

A fully equipped trading post stocked with BSA equipment will be open at select times during the camp session. We will also have a snack bar with light snack, drinks, slushies, and ice cream will also be open. Scouts should not bring large amounts of money because it can become easily lost at camp.

Tobacco-Free Policy

All areas of Camp John J. Barnhardt are tobacco free.

Medical & Medication

Make sure the Medical Officer and Camp Director are aware of any special needs a Scout may have. Simple first aid and medical concerns may be treated at the health Lodge on a 24-hour basis by the Medical Officer. Major concerns will be handled by transporting the scout/leader to the local hospital.

Each Pack is responsible for distribution of medicine for its Scouts. Each Pack will need a locked box to keep all prescription medication secured. Prescription medication should be in its original container and properly identified. Prescription medications should never be in a Scout's possession. Self-administered medications are permitted to be administered by the Scouts themselves with supervision of pack leaders. Emergency medications such as an inhaler or EpiPen are allowed to be carried by scout.

Transportation

Transportation of scouts to camp may be made by individual families or carpools. Guidelines (permission slips and two-deep leadership) must be followed. Cars must stay in the parking lot during the camp session. No individual cars/trucks will be allowed in the program areas.

Non-Discrimination Statement

This program is for all BSA registered youth regardless of race, creed, nationality, gender, or religion.

Youth Leaving Early Form

Once a Scout has checked into our summer camp program, he is not authorized to leave except in an emergency unless prior approval has been given.

Prior approval can be granted for a Scout to be picked up before the end of the camping period for such things as sports events or family vacations.

The Scout's parents or legal guardian must notify the Camp Administration in writing that a Scout may have an interrupted or shortened day at Camp John J. Barnhardt. This written statement must include the departure information and return information if the Scout is going to return. It must also detail who is authorized to pick up the child. Both parent and Scout leader in charge must sign the release form.

Upon the arrival at camp of the adult planning on picking up the camper, the adult must check in at the Camp Office. The Camp Administration will notify the adult leader of the unit, who will verify that this is the correct adult to pick up the camper. If this is confirmed, the administration will release the camper.

If an adult leader must take a scout home due to an unforeseen emergency, he must inform the Camp Administration of his reasons and plans. If the Scout is not related, two-deep is needed for the transportation.

All people leaving and coming into Camp John J. Barnhardt must sign the check-in/check-out log in the Camp Office in addition to the above procedures.

Summer Camp Special Dietary Needs Form

The Central NC Council, Boy Scouts of America, strives to serve its campers nutritious meals which meet or exceed all applicable requirements and standards. The variety of foods available at meals is usually adequate to suit the nutritional needs of most campers. In order to meet the needs of participants who have special dietary requirements due to allergies, food intolerances, or other health issues, as well as those who follow alternate diets for ethical or religious reasons, it is necessary to obtain as much information as possible prior to arrival at camp.

Please be as specific as possible regarding the exact nature and severity of any allergy or intolerance. This information is necessary to determine whether the individual can simply avoid eating certain foods, whether we need to assess all ingredients in every food, or whether offending foods can or cannot be stored or served where they may contact the individual or things he or she may eat. Please note that we will make every effort to accommodate special requests. However, due to our open kitchens that handle the major allergens, gluten and other ingredients for the preparation of other menu items, we cannot guarantee that items will be completely "free" of any ingredient. While we make every effort to avoid cross-contact, the potential for cross-contact does still exist. We encourage guests to ask to speak to the Dining Hall Manager regarding any questions about the ingredients contained in the food being considered. While the Central NC Council attempts to provide meals which meet these special needs as much as possible, it is still the responsibility of the individual to avoid those foods which he or she is unable to eat. In some rare cases, it may be necessary for the camper to bring some food items, which can then be prepared by the camp staff.
